Note: Lufthansa buses from Francfort also stop at the station:

- You can either take a taxi, or
- It is a 15mn's walk, or
- There is a tram from the station to the hotel: line A or D; stop called Homme de Fer.
  The hotel is some 50 m away just beyond the department store called Galeries
  Lafayette. You will need to purchase a tram ticket at the stop for 1.60 euro (unless
  you have bought a "combined" Tram + TER ticket at the airport).

#### In Strasbourg

- The Cathedral, which celebrates its 1000th anniversary and its surroundings
- BATORAMA: Guided tours of Strasbourg on river boats. Next to the Cathedral, board one of the river boats to embark on a 70 minutes discovery tour through Strasbourg, an historical city and home to the European Parliament. http://www.batorama.com/
- The old district called Petite France with its typical streets and houses
- The Palais des Rohan, very close to the Cathedral
- The Musée de l'oeuvre Notre Dame, with houses original pieces from the Cathedral and shows an exhibition on "The gothic revolution"
- The surrounding old district
- The museums:
  - Musée historique (historical museum of the city of Strasbourg)
  - Musée alsacien (Alsatian museum: typical furniture and loc al traditions)
  - Musée Tomi Ungerer (or caricature museum)
- The European district, with the building of the Council of Europe, the European Parliament, the European Court of Human rights, etc...

#### **Outside Strasbourg**

- For those who have time to go out of Strasbourg, don't miss the Wine Route
   (<a href="http://www.route-des-vins-alsace.com/en">http://www.route-des-vins-alsace.com/en</a>): The best way is to rent a car and you can stop in any of the small typical villages and the bigger towns like Colmar (<a href="http://www.ot-colmar.fr/en/prepare">http://www.ot-colmar.fr/en/prepare</a>), and its famous Musée Unterlinden with the celebrated Issenheim altarpiece) visit cellars and taste wine...
- For those who prefer nature, Alsace is one the regions in Europe with the highest number of fortified castles (<a href="http://www.chateauxfortsalsace.com">http://www.chateauxfortsalsace.com</a>) and a dense net of hiking trails.
